MFL Subject Vision

Modern Foreign Languages is an important part of our school curriculum. As a school, we learn French. French is a very well-known language spoken in 29 countries across the world. French is also spoken within our school community making this a crucial aspect of our learning. Learning French allows French speaking children time to learn more and expand their own home spoken language; but it also encourages friendships between other children who are just beginning to learn. French will help build communities and start conversations.

MFL and St. Paul's Values & Ethos

The following St Paul's values are intertwined in our unique Languages curriculum.

Friendship and Nurturing:

Throughout our French lessons children will encourage and help each other with their language skills. They will also start to be able to communicate with others using French and build new friendships that they might not have had the chance to do before due to language barriers.

Respect and Tolerance:

Through French, children will understand that even though people do not speak the same language, everyone should be respected. Honesty and Integrity:

Thankfulness and Joy:

The French curriculum will allow children to expand their language ability and allow them to communicate with other French speaking people within their community. The lessons will be fun with songs and activities to help them remember the new language learnt.

Perseverance and Courage:

Through French, children will understand that learning a whole new language can be hard and it can take some time to get used to. Children will be able to keep practising, even when something has gone wrong or been forgotten and they shall be brave enough to practise in front of their peers.

The national curriculum for languages aims to ensure that all pupils:

- understand and respond to spoken and written language from a variety of authentic sources
- speak with increasing confidence, fluency and spontaneity, finding ways of communicating what they want to say, including through discussion and asking questions, and continually improving the accuracy of their pronunciation and intonation
- can write at varying length, for different purposes and audiences, using the variety of grammatical structures that they have learnt
- discover and develop an appreciation of a range of writing in the language studied
